Speke community digs in to plant 1,500 trees

Over 100 local people mucked in to plant trees in Speke last weekend, as part of a project that is set to brighten up key transport routes in the area over the coming years.

Over the course of the weekend, over 1500 trees including 350m of hedgerow were planted in Speke's Mill Wood and along Aldefield Drive.

Around 90 school children from Middlefield Primary School and St Ambrose Catholic Primary School took part in the planting on Friday afternoon, and volunteers from the Friends of Mill Wood and other members of the community helped out on Sunday.

The planting was part of a long-term project to green the transport routes leading to Speke's industrial centre. The planting near Mill Wood and Alderwood was also aimed at enhancing the local wildlife habitats.

Organised by The Mersey Forest and funded by the Department for Transport via the Merseyside Local Sustainable Transport Fund, the programme is aimed at promoting and supporting sustainable access to employment opportunities in Merseyside and is delivered as part of Merseyside's TravelWise campaign.

Additional funding for the tree planting came from the national Big Tree Plant campaign through Defra and the Community Environment Fund sourced locally.

Over the coming weeks, volunteers from the Merseyside Youth Association are set to continue planting trees in Speke.

Ben Greenaway, Green Streets Coordinator at The Mersey Forest, said: "It was great to see so many people turn out over the course of the weekend to help us plant the trees.

"As the trees mature, they will brighten this part of Speke, helping to make the area an attractive place to invest and create jobs."
